MRS. LOUGHEED - 1543 Westminster Highway, Richmond, B. C.

Mrs. Lougheed, born in 1885, came to Ladner, B. C. as a bride in 1905 from Ontario. They moved to Richmond in 1919, to a farm at the present location. Westminster Highway was not a through-road at that time, thus to get into the farm one had to travel No. 5 Rd., then planked, north to Cambie, east on Cambie to No. 7 Rd., south on No. 7 to the farm. Westminster Highway began at No. 7 Rd. again, to New Westminster. Mrs. Lougheed had a son, now living in Vernon, who attended Trites School. The school served the children of east Richmond.

Trites School

- On south west corner No. 7 Rd. & Westminster Highway.
- One room square grey building, with wood siding and shingle roof.
- Steps to the entrance, inside a small room for coats before entering the classroom.
- Outside toilets - until after World War II.
- Heated by a box stove.
- Electricity brought in after World War II.
- There was a phone in 1919.
- Most children walked to school.
- Used for community affairs, such as First Aid, during the Second World War.

Bridgeport School

- Mrs. Lougheed's children drove a horse and buggy in the 20's. The horses were put in the shed at the school.
